There were none

Action on Minutes of Previous Meetings as Follows

Minutes of the Town Board Meeting of May 2, 2023, Special Meeting of May 12, 2023 and Agenda and Special Meeting of May 30, 2023 were presented to the Board. A motion was made by Councilman Boudreau, seconded by Councilwoman Marble to accept the minutes as presented. All voted in favor of the motion.

Committee Reports

Financial Report and Submission of Bills and Petty Cash

Supervisor Lawler read the financial reports for the month of May 2023. The audited vouchers totaled \$ 269,474.86 and the payments in advance of audit totaled \$16,197.20. The petty cash report totaled \$68.42. A motion to accept the financial report, pay the abstracts and reimburse petty cash was made by Councilman Boudreau and seconded by Councilwoman Marble. All voted in favor of the motion.

Committee on Highway, Wastewater Treatment, Water Authority, Cemetery, Museum and Town Historian

Councilman Boudreau read the Highway Department May 2023 Report: The sewer vac truck was used to assist the water department in pumping out water at the Bells Lane pump station and cleaning out shut off valves at various locations. All town ball fields and parks were mowed and maintained. All vehicles and equipment continue to be serviced and repaired. 2 Storm drain catch basins and 1 manhole was rebuilt on Vanderwerken Ave. and 3rd Ave., Dock installation was completed at the Visitors Center. Tree cleanup was completed at the Saratoga Ave. cemetery. Trees were taken down and removed on Arch Street and Birch Glen Park. 12 flower baskets were installed on Saratoga Ave. and 12 Baskets were installed along the visitors center waterfront. Town camera equipment was used to identify a road depression on Towpath Ln. Cause found to be a separated storm water pipe located under the road in the north bound lane. 5 Tons of asphalt binder and 7 tons of blacktop was used in road repair. 10 Tons of crusher run was used for sewer pump station road repair. 22 Tons of crusher run was used for reconstruction of Fulton Street. 360 Yards of trash was collected. 30 Yards of scrap metal was collected. 360

Yards of green waste was collected. The Highway Department responded to 34 service requests and processed 59 Dig Safe requests with 3 emergencies.

Councilman Boudreau then read the WPCF Operation Summary for the month of May 2023

Average Influent Flow: 890,000 gallons/day

We removed: 10,000 gallons of sludge to Albany County, 54,000 gallons of sludge to Saratoga County

Alarms answered:2 ; High Flow-0, Power-0, Mechanical-2, Phone-0, Testing-0

Normal Maintenance:

Checked all pump stations and cleaned floats as needed.

Continued maintenance of outside grounds, equipment, and vehicles.

Removed influent primary grease from primary tanks and weirs on weekly basis.

Drained, cleaned, and inspected primary tank #1 for a future maintenance project and then it was put back into service.

Repaired a damaged wire in UV disinfection system control panel, all is in good working order.

We used the Vac truck to clean out the Canvasback Ridge and Front Street pump stations.

Glen from Troy Belting removed the old alarm notification system components from all of the pump stations and at the main plant. We will be updating the new cellular system over the next few months which will give the on-call personnel more specific information about an alarm such as “pump in failure”, “power outage”, “high level”, and “utilizing back up power source”.

The Wastewater Department would like to remind residents to please refrain from dumping/flushing wipes and other non biodegradable materials down your toilet or through your garbage disposals. Please look on the Towns website for more information. Submitted by Craig F. Falcone, Chief Operator.

The Councilman then went on to read the monthly report from the Waterford Water Commissioners.

1. Water Consumption – The Water Works delivered approximately 29,266,079 gallons or 944,067 gpd of water during the month.

2. Water Distribution System Work – The staff completed close to 58 dig-safe utility locations as well as 121 service calls during the month. In addition to calls, staff calibrated & maintained equipment, completed monthly water testing, and completed meter reading.

3. Meter Installation –Staff continues to reach out to residents and schedule replacement of old meters with drive by read meters. Staff have logged 2634 meters installed to date.

4. Hydrant Maintenance – Maintenance and painting is in progress, It is anticipated that over 150 Hydrants are to be painted over the next two months. If there are any questions or concerns, we can be reached through our website www.waterfordwater.org or by phone 518-237-0422.

5. Get the Lead Out – As part of the initiative to be completely free of lead services, we are currently completing our Service Inventory Report as required by the NYS DOH. Reports are due to the State by Oct 31st 2024. We are on track to have ours completed and submitted this summer by Mid-July 2023. We currently far exceed State Requirements for Lead and Copper testing and are actively engaged in leading the industry in achieving a completely lead-free system. There are currently less than 1% of our customer’s services that still contain lead. We are currently working to find ways to help those customers to replace their obsolete services. We will report on this as the program continues.

Councilman Boudreau read a monthly report from Town Historian Russ Vandervoort. He attended a two-day session in Schuylerville for the future observance of the 250th Anniversary of the Battles of Saratoga. This event is not scheduled until 2027. There will be events leading up to it. Commissions have been formed on the national, state, and county levels to prepare for this. It has been recommended that the local municipalities form commissions to follow suit. Waterford was well represented at the battle with the Van Schoonhoven Regiment. Waterford and Peebles Island were assembly locations for the battle, and Peebles Island was to be the next line of defense had we failed at Saratoga.

Attended the exhibit opening at the Saratoga County History Center of Saratoga County, Our Home. Waterford has several items in the exhibit, including a stove and a harness, among others. I have been working with Brad Utter, former Waterford Town Historian and Museum Director, on the research of Lysander Button and Daniel B. King. Daniel was a very controversial Village President mid 19th Century.

I am in regular contact with an ancestor of the Rynder Family. This family is unknown to most today, but arguably two of the biggest characters in Waterford's History were Maria and Isaiah Rynders. Maria was said to have had ten husbands. We have found two more, bringing her confirmed total to four, The search continues. Isaiah was a character in the book and movie, "Gangs of New York" although not by name. Maria was the inspiration for the character Mrs. Quackenbush in the book Rome Haul and the movie, "The farmer takes a Wife."

Working with David Waite, a fellow historian on the Waterford Lion's Club participation in the gathering of milkweed pods for the war effort during WW II. The down inside the pods was very buoyant. They could be used to stuff life preservers that were in unnatural demand due to the war. The Lion's Club organized the Waterford effort and paid a bounty of each bag as an incentive to the collectors. He led an interpretive walk on the old Champlain Canal during Canal Fest, attended by about 30 people. Nearly all were non Waterfordian, and those who were, were new to Waterford.

Committee on Public Safety, Emergency Services, and Liaison to Village

Councilman Ball read the summary of police activity for the month as submitted by Sgt. Michael Shudt. There were 55 arrests, 152 traffic tickets, 7 motor vehicle accidents, and 543 calls for service. Other Activity: All officers received training in updated handling of evidence. The Waterford Rescue Squad donated two patrol bikes to the PD to replace aging bicycles.

The Councilman made note of other calls for the month: There were seven cases closed and nine investigations opened. There were 23 domestic calls, 7 fire calls and 25 EMS calls.

Committee on Veterans, Grants and Funding, Special Projects, Town Hall and Seniors

Supervisor Lawler stated that Councilman McClement is out of town for training.

Committee on Youth, Playground, Pool, Festivals, Library, WHUFSD, Visitor Center and Building Department

Councilwoman Marble stated that the Pool Opening Day is June 24 at noon. The hours are 12-6pm- seven days a week through August 20th.

The Park Program at Clement Park will open for the season June 26th. Hours are Monday thru Friday 10-2pm through August 18th.

There will be a new program on Thursdays at Clement Park it is the Kids at Heart Club which involves our Seniors. This program will run the length of the summer program.

Eileen Haldeman will be heading up this program, she has a lot of fun things planned and already has some seniors from the center signed up to participate. This program is run through the Office of the Aging.

The Car Cruise is June 17th at Sugarloaf Pond. There will be cars, dancing, music, food and beverages. Rain date is June 24th. The Fishing Derby will be held on June 25th at Sugarloaf Pond. There will be prizes, cornhole, trophies, bird house painting until they run out and ice cream sundaes. Movie nights start in July.

The Councilwoman then gave an update on the Waterford Halfmoon School. June 6th- Elementary Spring Concert from 7-8PM, June 7th –Spring Athletics Award Night 6-7PM, Auditorium, June 8th- Jr/Sr High Academic Awards presentation 6:30-8:00PM, June 9th is the end of the marking period for K-6 and Senior Moving Up Day. June 13th- Sports Booster Meeting 6-8PM, June 14-16 Regents Exams.

Senior Juliana Foster received an award for her community service efforts and Senior Tess Gleason was one of twelve students in the County honored for her community service. Both of these young ladies are members of the National Honor Society and spend a lot of time volunteering and fundraising.

Councilwoman Marble read Building Department report for May 2023. There were 29 building permits issued, 21 Onsite construction inspections, 41 stops for overgrown properties, 1 order to remedy for overgrowth, 14 stops for roadside trash/ items, 1 unsafe accessory structure has been removed. The dilapidated barn on Fonda Road has been disassembled and removed. 3 tenant / landlord complaints. Work has started back up on 60 Clifton St. The road has been graded in Riberdy Grove.

Councilwoman Marble then read an update from Waterford Library Director Tim McDonough. The 2024 Library Budget Vote takes place on Wednesday June 7th, from 10am-6pm at the library. All residents of the Waterford School District are eligible to vote, you do NOT need to be a property owner, you just need to live in the district. There is a copy of our proposed budget available on our website, or folks can stop by the library to pick one up.

We will host an author talk on Saturday June 10th at 1pm. Local author Karen DeBonis will be discussing her new memoir, "Growth : A Mother and Her Son and the Brain Tumor they Survived"

On Tuesday June 20th, National Grid Consumer Advocate Kari Kelly will be at the library from 3-6pm to answer customer questions about their utility service. She will be joined by representatives from several social service agencies providing information as well.

The library has several fishing poles and gear to loan out to community residents. Please stop by the library for complete information.
