Please remember parking restrictions on many roads go into effect throughout the Town beginning November 1. These restrictions help our Highway staff to maintain safe roads throughout the winter months and your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

The current economy is presenting a struggle for communities to maintain funding for town services while also keeping the taxes below the State mandated 2% tax cap. I am very proud to say that once again we will continue our long standing practice of providing quality services without exceeding the 2% tax cap. The main reason why we are able to do this is the strong and trusted working relationship between the Town Board and its employees in sharing a common goal to provide these services in the most economical and efficient way. I would like to

personally thank the Board Members and all our Town employees for their hard work in achieving this goal.

It goes without saying that our seniors and our community in general deserve a facility that provides pleasant amenities to gather and hold events. I am very pleased to announce that we recently held the ground breaking ceremony for the start of construction of the

new Waterford Community/Senior Center. The new facility is located on the corner of North Second and Columbia Streets, directly behind the Waterford Library and adjacent to the Waterford Water Works Building. We expect the building will be completed early spring 2016. I would like to thank Councilwoman Laurie Marble and all the individuals that helped make this Center happen. The Town of Waterford will be celebrating its 200<sup>th</sup> birthday next year. The Waterford Police Department has been recognized in the past by numerous State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies for their high level of professionalism and accountability. The Department's recent re-accreditation by the Division of Criminal Justice Services is a testament to their dedication to Waterford and its residents. We would like to congratulate all of the members of the Department and Public Safety Commissioner John Tanchak for this outstanding achievement. The Department prides itself on the quality of police service it provides to our residents by utilizing state of the art technology to ensure its officers are fully trained and equipped to do their jobs. The Town Board recently approved the purchase of body camera technology to improve communications and safety of our officers. The cameras will be operational in the coming months.

Replacement of the NYS Route 32 Cohoes-Waterford Bridge has been confirmed by NYSDOT. The work is scheduled to begin this fall. The plans are to keep the current bridge open as they construct the new one, minimizing the need for re-routing traffic during construction. The expected project completion is December 2017. 

# Waterford Residents Who Make A Difference

Neil Quantock, a lifelong resident of Waterford, has been the Town of Waterford's Medical Van Driver for the past 14 years. Neil is responsible for the scheduling and transportation of residents to and from their medical appointments Monday thru Thursday. Neil also oversees the maintenance schedules of the senior vehicles and was instrumental in the purchase earlier this year of our new handicap accessible lift bus. His compassion and commitment to his work allows every passenger to feel safe and cared for. Neil has often expressed his enjoyment for his work throughout the years and is committed to the betterment of Waterford and its residents.



Neil and his wife Cinny have been married for 51 years and have two daughters, Laurie and Julie, and three grandchildren. Neil is a veteran of the US Army retiring after 37 years as a Command Sergeant Major (CSM). ## New Metal Detector Installed at Waterford Town Court

The Waterford Police Department is responsible for keeping Waterford Town Court a safe and secure environment. There are security measures in place for everyone that enters the courthouse which are not intended to harass, exclude or inconvenience anyone. Cooperation is requested of everyone in order to achieve this goal. This past year, through a grant from the Office of Court Administration, a metal detector was purchased and installed in the courtroom. When you enter the courtroom you must go through the metal detector and security screening procedures conducted by security personnel. You are required to empty your pockets and place the contents in a container for further inspection. In general, any item(s) that could be used to harm or injure another person is not permitted and/or any other item a member of the security staff perceives as a threat to the safety and security of the building and the persons within the courtroom.

## Prohibited Items Include, But Are Not Limited To:

Weapons of any type;

Cutting instruments of any type - including knives, scissors, box cutters, work tools, and large metal nail files;

Firearms, ammunition and explosive devices;

Handcuffs, handcuff keys, knitting needles, or anything with a cutting edge, etc.;

Pepper spray, mace or any other chemical defense sprays;

Alcohol or illegal substances, including illegal drugs;

Toy guns, baseball bats, or flammable liquids



Individuals possessing any of the above prohibited items will be required to leave the courthouse and return without them in their possession.

**The Highway Department** would like to remind all town residents that leaf bags are picked up on Mondays and Fridays, as the schedule allows. They must be biodegradable and weigh no more than 40lbs. All brush and branches must be no longer than four (4) feet and tied in manageable bundles.

With the winter season approaching we would like remind town residents that parking is prohibited on certain streets starting November 1st until March 31st. These streets are <u>clearly marked</u>. We are asking for your cooperation in assisting in the snow removal process and to follow all posted signs.

## The Town Building Department would like

to remind town residents that building permits are required for all new construction, such as new heating system, kitchens & bathrooms, new windows, and any new electric work. The Town also requires building permits for the following: Swimming pools- above ground and in ground, Sheds, Decks, Signs, Porches, Sun Rooms, Tanks, Solar Panels and Fences.  ${old J}$ he Waterford Town Board has a combined experience of over 70 years serving the

residents of Waterford. Each councilperson oversees a specific department or committee in town government. Councilman Frank McClement, who became a Town Board member in 2013, is the Liaison for Canal Development, Grants and Program Funding, Community Groups and is the Village Government Liaison. Councilman Jim Boudreau, Liaison to the Highway Department, Wastewater Treatment, Water Authority and Cemetery, has served as Town Board member since 2007. Councilman Dave Ball has been on the Board for twelve years and is the liaison to Public Safety, Emergency Services and Veterans Affairs. Councilwoman Laurie Marble, Deputy Supervisor, is

currently the liaison for Youth, Seniors, Parks and Playgrounds, Pool and Festivals and has served on the Town Board since 2003. Supervisor John Lawler who has held this position for 22 years, represents close to 9000 residents and oversees a combined operating budget of 6.5 million dollars. As Supervisor, he also a member of the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors. Town Clerk, Darlene Dziarcak is responsible for all legal notices and bids, issuance of birth and death certificates and maintains town records. She is also receiver of taxes and public registrar. Darlene has been Town Clerk for seventeen years. The monthly Town Board Meeting is held the first Tuesday of the month at 7pm. The Town Agenda Meeting is held the last Tuesday of the month, also at 7pm. If you have recently driven by Town Hall you hopefully have noticed our new LED message board installed in the Town Clerk's office window. This new sign replaces our old letter mounted sign near the entry door. The new LED sign provides better visibility and allows us to display more detailed messages to the residents about upcoming meetings and events.

# Useful Tips... If you are involved in an auto accident -



**1. Keep an Emergency Kit in Your Glove Compartment.** Drivers should carry a cell phone, as well as pen and paper for taking notes. It is also a good idea to carry a set of cones, warning triangles or emergency flares in the trunk of your vehicle.

**2. Keep Safety First.** Drivers involved in minor accidents with no serious injuries should move cars to the side of the road and out of the way of oncoming traffic. Leaving cars parked in the middle of the road or busy intersection can result in additional accidents and injuries.

**3. Exchange Information.** After the accident, exchange the following information: name, address, phone number, insurance company, policy number, driver license number and license plate number for the driver and the owner of each vehicle. If the driver's name is different from the name of the insured, establish what the relationship is and take down the name and address for each individual. Also make a written description of each car, including year, make, model and color — and the exact location of the collision and how it happened. Finally, be polite but don't tell the other drivers or the police that the accident was your fault, even if you think it was.

**4. Photograph and Document the Accident.** Use your cell phone to document the damage to all the vehicles. Keep in mind that you want your photos to show the overall context of the accident so that you can make your case to a claims adjuster. If there were witnesses, try to get their contact information; they may be able to help you if the other drivers dispute your version of what happened.

**5. File An Accident Report.** Although law enforcement officers in many locations may not respond to accidents unless there are injuries, drivers should file a state vehicle accident report, which is available at police stations and often on the Department of Motor Vehicles Web site as a downloadable file.

Remember – if you are involved in an auto accident:

\*Call 9-11 \*Take photos of both vehicles and the scene of the accident \*Get contact information of all witnesses
\*Keep track of injuries and see a doctor as soon as possible \*Contact an attorney

\*Do not sign any documents from the other driver's insurance company

\*Do not speak to other driver's insurance company without an attorney present
